Staff also participated in road safety campaigns. The Regulator went out of its way to donate tree seedlings, sponsor Eldama Ravine Half Marathon for refurbishment of social amenities in Baringo County. #### **CEO'S MESSAGE**

s we continue to strengthen the regulatory framework for the water service, this year saw a number of key guidelines developed and operationalised, despite the challenges posed by the global COVID 19 pandemic.

As disease outbreaks are not likely to disappear in the near future, proactive international actions are required to not only save lives but also protect economic prosperity. WASREB in conjunction with partners held workshops for over 30 Counties for development of post COVID-19 financial recovery plans (FRPs). The data driven process is required to ensure WSPs prioritize areas mostly affected by the pandemic, to catalyse a financial turnaround.

Development of the Water Governance Training Handbook was a major milestone for WASREB. The Training Handbook is meant to standardise the training given to oversight bodies namely Boards of Directors of Water Service Providers and Counties. This will increase understanding of good governance and will hopefully reduce conflict and misinterpretation of the law as far as governance of WSPs is concerned.

Other key guidelines disseminated during the period included Guideline on Provision of Water Services in the Rural and Underserved Areas, a tool that is helping the Regulator report on water service coverage nationally, considering that current commercialised utilities cover only about 50% of the national population. Also disseminated were the Non-Revenue Management Standards which are geared towards helping WSPs manage the water losses hence improving on their financial sustainability.

As we look to the future, our interest is on the licencing of all WSPs operating in the country. Over 60 utilities have so far been licensed laying a foundation for well managed entities/services with serious commitment and responsibility for consumer/customer satisfaction. Licences for another 13 WSPs are currently under consideration.

As we look to the future, our interest is on the licencing of all WSPs operating in the country.

Finally, all this could not have been realised without close collaboration between WASREB, the Counties, Water Works Development Agencies, Water Service Providers, the Council of Governors and Development Partners. To all of them a big thank you!

WASREB remains committed to enforcing high performance in the sector which cannot happen without support from all our stakeholders.

## THE 7<sup>TH</sup> AND FINAL ANNUAL DEVOLUTION CONFERENCE HELD IN MAKUENI COUNTY

he Seventh and Final Annual Devolution Conference on Multi-Level Governance for Climate Change took place from 23-26th November, 2021, at Makueni Boys' High School-Makueni County. This followed postponements due to the prevailing COVID-19 pandemic.

The high level event, was all about Climate Change and how to mitigate its effects. Global warming is causing long-lasting changes to our climate system and threatens lives and livelihoods around the world. Worth noting is that the world is still off track from keeping global warming within the 1.5 degrees Celsius limit set by the scientific community.

Consequently, the Council of Governors brought on board policymakers and county leaders at the 7th and final Devolution Conference to deliberate on the effects of climate change and the interventions needed to curb this crisis. The sub-theme 'Sub-National mobilisation in unlocking the full potential of climate action during and after the pandemic,' was proposed to guide the two levels of government in combating climate change. The conference served as an avenue for all players to support communities to prepare, mitigate and respond to the effects of climate.

The conference was officially opened virtually by H.E President Uhuru Kenyatta. During his opening statement, he lauded implementation of devolution and stated that of all the development programmes and initiatives implemented since independence none have had a more impactful and transformative result than Devolution. He

confirmed the government's resolve to play its part in the international community's effort to address climate change including preventing global temperatures rising above 1.5 degrees Celcius. Several plenary sessions were held to get the conference to chart the way forward in climate action.

The conference brought together more than 3,000 delegates comprising of the citizenry, Governors and Deputy Governors, Senators,

Cabinet Secretaries, Members of Parliament and County Assemblies, Private Sector, Media, Development Partners, Civil Society Organisations, among others.

Meanwhile, WASREB staff and Board members participated in the conference as delegates and at the exhibition where staff engaged members of the public and distributed IEC materials and publications.

## WASREB HOLDS 10 PUBLIC CONSULTATION MEETINGS ON LICENCE

WASREB conducted a series of public consultation meetings for licensing of various Water Service Providers across the country. Categorized as per the period when the public consultations were done between July and December, these were; Gatundu, Samburu, Imetha, Iten Tambach, Tatu City, Chemususu, Kericho, Tetu Aberdare, Busia and Migori.

Various stakeholders, staff, management teams of the WSPs, local government officials and county chiefs attended the meetings where various issues and topical concerns were addressed substantively. Some of the main issues addressed were:

- Performance of the WSPs including governance issues, which they wanted WASREB to clarify
- Possibility of splitting of a WSP like Kericho to allow for Litein residents manage their own company
- 3) Water shortage
- 4) Poor sewerage services
- 5) Political interference
- 6) Importance/why the licensing process is necessary, among others.

Stakeholders at the end of the meetings resolved and agreed that WASREB should license their various WSPs in order for them to continue with the service delivery.

The meetings were held in strict adherence to Ministry of Health Guidelines on combating the prevailing COVID-19 pandemic.

## CONSUMERS AIR THEIR VIEWS IN TARIFF PUBLIC CONSULTATIONS MEETINGS





WASREB has the regulatory mandate to determine and review water and sanitation tariffs in Kenya, with the overarching goal of consumer protection. The regulator acts as a referee to offer confidence to all stakeholders of clear, transparent and stable rules in the process.

The revenue from tariffs seeks to ensure adequate and efficient resource allocation of funds with an overall goal of attaining 100% access to water for all Kenyans. Justified tariffs are those where each component cost has been analyzed and confirmed as prudent and necessary for the sustainability of all stakeholders and accompanying revenue allocated through a pricing mechanism. The complete process is subject to public participation with the aim to inform and seek buy-in with consumers.

In this regard, WASREB in conjunction with utilities held three public consultation meetings tariff on adjustment of Kakamega, Kisumu and Kericho before the year ended. Stakeholders participated by giving their views on tariff adjustment. The moderated by WASREB, events were attended by a cross section of stakeholders. They resolved that WASREB should approve the proposed changes in the WSP's tariffs.

#### **WASREB RUNS A SUSTAINED MEDIA CAMPAIGN**



WASREB sought authentic information from Water Service Providers, County Chiefs and Consumers in Nakuru, Nyeri and Uasin Gishu Counties on the state of water and sanitation services in their regions.

Consumer sensitization is one of WASREB's key mandate, reporting to the public on progress made in the sector. An informed consumer is able to participate in the affairs of water service provision as well as, make decisions on what kind of services they want to be given to them.

In this regard, WASREB carried out a one month media campaign through CITIZEN Television and KTN HOME in November. Five informercials and one Documentary were run. Messages were on Importance of the Licence in Regulation, Water Pricing (Justified Tariffs), Consumer rights and responsibilities, Curbing Non-Revenue Water and National and County Governments collaboration.

Going forward, we will endeavor to educate and inform our stakeholders through various platforms to ensure they are well informed and empowered. Be on the look out as we roll out Media Campaign Phase 2'!

#### WASREB ENGAGES COUNTIES ON GOVERNANCE



ounty Engagement took a new form, with WASREB using face to face, round table, courtesy calls and workshops to reach out to Counties on the question of good governance, as it is pertinent to high performance of the water utilities they represent.

County engagement in eight (8) Counties namely: Trans-Nzoia, Machakos, Kajiado, Makueni, Elgeyo Marakwet, Nakuru, Kiambu and Homabay were done. WASREB made of use of partnerships to execute these engagements. They were done as below;

WASREB engaged County Executive Committee Members (CECMs) and Management staff of Nzoia WSP in Kisumu, held a joint Board of Directors' induction for Nol Turesh and Oloolaiser WSPs in Naivasha, organized another two-day workshop mainly focusing on Corporate Governance Guideline where CECMs from Machakos, Kajiado and Makueni Counties were in attendance.

In the month of November, WASREB in conjunction with UNICEF Kenya held a three day workshop in Naivasha on water governance, for County governments and WSPs Management teams that operate under them. They were from Nairobi, Nakuru and Homabay. Similarly, WASREB in conjunction with Kenya Markets Trust organized a two-day conference on the National Water Governance Conversation in Naivasha mid-November. Various sector institutions represented included County Governments- (Elgeyo Marakwet, Nakuru, Kiambu), other government Agencies

namely; Water Resource Authority, Water Sector Trust Fund, Kenya Water Institute, Water Works Development Agencies, Water Service Providers, Development partners WASHFIN Kenya, UNICEF, World Bank, Education institutions, Strathmore Business Hub, University of Nairobi among others.

During the conference highlights of the Water Governance Training Handbook (a first of its kind) were shared. The Training Handbook is geared to streamline governance issues across the water sector in Kenya.

















The various teams engaged in the workshops concured that a turn around for the WSPs was an imperative.

#### WASREB DISSEMINATES KEY GUIDELINES



### Guideline on Provision of Water for Rural and Underserved Areas in Kenya

This guideline for Provision of Water for Rural and Underserved Areas was developed with the aim of: Ensuring that water service standards are adhered to in terms of quality, cost and customer service in order to to guarantee health and safety of consumers, regularizing rural water service in order to streamline, professionalize and formalize operations. It also meant to enable the County Governments to operationalize section 94 of the Water Act 2016 that requires the devolved governments to focus on areas that are not commercially viable under the guiding principle of leaving no one behind.

In this regard, WASREB in conjunction with Kenya Markets Trust (KMT) held meetings with Laikipia and Embu County governments officials and Water Service Providers serving the areas, to discuss ways of streamlining rural water services in Embu.

A similar workshop for WSPs and County Chiefs under Tanathi and Coast regions took place in Mombasa in October.

#### Non Revenue Water Standards

Current levels of Non Revenue Water according to IMPACT 13 2021 report stands at 47%. In financial terms at the current average of NRW at 47% and the sector turnover of Kshs. 22.8 Billion, against an acceptable sector benchmark of 20%, then conservatively, the sector is losing slightly more than Kshs. 11.61 Billion. This not only threatens the financial sustainability of the sector but also wastes funds, which could otherwise be used to increase access and improve service delivery. This is a worrying trend that must be curbed.

The above fore-goings pushed WASREB in conjunction with Kenya Markets Trust to hold a workshops which brought together 16 WSPs from Easter region in Machakos and 15 WSPs from Western region in Kisumu respectively. The topic was NRW performance Review Workshop- Post IMPACT 13 Release, to reflect on the status of Non Revenue Water management by the WSPs. Issues deliberated on included:

a) Incorporating in the license condition a requirement for a strategy to deal with NRW

including having the requisite structure and staff

- b) Revision of the NRW management standards to incorporate the lessons learnt in the last six years of implementation
- c) Having NRW as a key component in assessing the potential of a utility to turn around

#### **Corporate Governance Guideline**

The objective of the Corporate Governance Guideline is to improve how water service institutions especially water service providers are led and managed, enhance the understanding of apt governance, clarifying autonomy and oversight and the structures and systems that are needed to have economical and efficient provision of water services.

Water Service Providers are required to adhere to the guideline in the entire process

of Board selection. In line with this, Nithi Water and Sanitation Company held a stakeholders consultation meeting to appoint members of the Selection Committee in preparation for an Annual General Meeting that was upcoming. Speakers who included WASREB, Water Resources Authority, Tana WWDA, Dep. County Commissioner, Chief Officer- Water Tharaka Nithi County attended the meeting held in Chuka.

Elsewhere, Embe Water and Sanitation Company held a stakeholders consultation meeting in Siakago, to appoint members of the Selection Committee in preparation for an upcoming Annual General Meeting. Speakers who included WASREB, Water Resource Authority, Tana WWDA, Chief Officer-Embu County, shed light on tenets of good governance, improvement on performance, importance of public participation among others.

#### **COVID 19 EFFECTS ON WSPs**



OVID-19 is not only a global pandemic and public health crisis; it has also severely affected the global economy and financial markets. Significant reductions in income, a rise in unemployment, and disruptions in the transportation, service, and manufacturing industries are among the consequences of the disease mitigation measures that have been implemented in many countries. It has become clear that most governments in the world underestimated the risks of rapid COVID-19 spread and were mostly reactive in their crisis response. As disease outbreaks are not likely to disappear in the near future, proactive international actions are required to not only save lives but also protect economic prosperity.

Equally, the water sector was not left behind. This necessitated workshops to review the impact of the pandemic on operations of the WSPs.

A Joint Sector Review workshop took place mid July at the Kenya School of Monetary Studies, Ruaraka to collate views from participants on lessons learnt while looking at challenges faced. The meeting jointly organized by WASREB and UNICEF brought together Utilities from Nakuru, Nairobi, Homabay and Naivasha Counties among others participants.

Elsewhere, WASREB in conjunction with WASHFIN held workshop in Naivasha for development of post COVID-19 financial recovery plans (FRPs). Participants included Managing Directors, Technical and Finance Managers from of utilities drawn from over eight Counties. They included; Eldoret, Thika, Ruiru Juja, Garissa among others.

Another workshop was organized in Naivasha for utilities drawn from close to 15 Counties. They included; Nakuru, Kisumu, Embu,

Nairobi, Kiambu, Murang'a, Nyeri among others. The data driven process is required to ensure WSPs prioritize areas mostly affected by the pandemic, to catalyse a financial turnaround.

In another development, WASREB in conjunction with UNICEF Kenya, held a workshop to analyse bottlenecks that hinder utilities from achieving their goals during the COVID 19 pandemic. The workshop held in Naivasha, brought together MDs, Senior Management teams from five (5) WSPs, Nairobi, Naivasha, Nakuru Rural, Nakuru Urban and Homabay. Athi, Coast and L. Victoria South WWDAs were present, including CECMs, Chief Officers and Directors from Nairobi, Homabay and Nakuru counties.

## TREE PLANTING IN CHEMUSUSU, MUMBERES AND NJABINI WATER TOWERS



Residents of Chemususu, Poror and Metipso in Baringo County turned up in large numbers to join WASREB fraternity to plant indigenous trees at Chemususu catchment area on 29th October, 2021. WASREB donated 2,500 seedlings. The team also moved to Mumberes Primary School in Eldama Ravine to give the pupils motivational talks and plant trees.

The next day, WASREB staff took part in the Eldama Ravine Half Marathon. The Regulator sponsored the venture with Kshs. 500,000. Proceeds from the marathon went to develop social economic ventures for the benefit of the activities. WASREB mounted an exhibition where staff engaged members of the public and distributed IEC materials and publications.

Meanwhile, WASREB fraternity joined Njabini residents in Nyandarua County to plant and grow trees at the Sasumua Dam catchment area on 30<sup>th</sup> October. The exercise was part of activities to mark freedom fighter Dedan Kimathi's 101 birthday. The campaign targeted to plant 10 million trees in water towers to boost forest cover by 10%. WASREB donated 2,500 seedlings.
